Intellectual competition teams at UTD serve to enhance our recruiting efforts with the brightest undergraduate students, bring recognition to the university regarding the quality of its undergraduate population, and educate the community to the importance of intellectual pursuits in the lives of educated people.

- **3.1 Evaluation of Intellectual Competition Scholarship:** Evaluation of the number of Intellectual Competition Scholarships Awarded.

A five percent increase in the number of Intellectual Competition Scholarships awarded without reducing the quality of students who receive the awards.

Intellectual Competition Scholarships are awared in Chess, Debate, and Destination Imagination.

This year our greatest success was in chess where we had 3 Texas students, 3 US students (Wisconsin, Nebraska, and Minnesota) and three International students (Serbia, Croatia, and Costa Rica) accept scholarships.

We increased the number of Debate scholarships from 4 to 6 with two out-of-state students accepting our offers.

Destination Imagination received an acceptance from the one offer we made in conjunction with the state tournament.

The Debate Team had its highest national finish at 15Th in the country following the 2005-2006 season.

They were named the South Central Regional Champions.

Senior debater Britt Clark was named to the All-American Debate Team.

Three UTD partnerships finished in the top 64 individual teams in the nation.

Destination Imagination fielded four teams this year.

Results include:

Four first place finishes in the state tournament.

Three first-place finishes and one second place finish in the Global Finals at The University of Tennessee

Finished first and second in the Global Finals Super Max Extreme event.

The Model United Nations Team again competed in the 2006 Nationals in Washinton DC.

They finished with three Outstanding Delegation Awards, three Outstanding Delegate Awards, and the Outstanding Position Paper Award. UTD won more awards than any other university in the competition.

The Legal Mediation Team participated in the 2005 National Mediation Tournament held at the John Marshall Law School in Chicago.

UTD finished third behind Boston College and Gonzaga. Three UTD students were selected as Intercollegiate All-American Mediators.

This year 19 schools visited the chess program with an average attendance of 18 for a total of 342 children.

Chess held its second summer `Chess Camp` for school-aged children. Over 250 children attended the two-week camps.

Destination Imagination held two workshops for children and local team coaches that attracted over 300 participants from the community.

UTD also served as the site for the regional Destination Imagination Competition which drew over 500 partipants.

Team members also spent considerable time within our local region helping manage elementary and secondary teams.

In debate, UTD held its third intercollegiate tournament which included 73 teams from more than 25 schools around the nation.

Chris Burke, Director of Debate, was selected as a judge for the final round of the National Debate Tournament. College Sports Television chose the UTD Debate Team to be featured in its documentary film of the National Debate Tournament.

7. Report:

7.1 Executive Summary:

The intellectual competition teams at UT Dallas finished one of their most successful years in history. The chess team, long a power house in collegiate chess, won several regional and national championships while finishing second in the major international competitions. They also enjoyed one of their best recruiting years.

Debate finished with their highest national ranking (15th) in their history. Several debaters won regional and national recognition for their performance. The team qualified for the national championship tournament for the third year in a row.

Destination Imagination teams completed more community service than ever before and won both the regional and state tournaments. They went on to record three first-place and one second-place finish at the World Finals.

The Model United Nations Team again competed in the 2006 Nationals in Washington DC. where they finished with three Outstanding Delegation Awards, three Outstanding Delegate Awards, and the Outstanding Position Paper Award. UTD won more awards than any other university in the competition.

The Legal Mediation Team participated in the 2005 National Mediation Tournament held at the John Marshall Law School in Chicago. UTD finished third behind Boston College and Gonzaga. Three UTD students were selected as Intercollegiate All-American Mediators.

7.5 Public Service:

Our primary community service came through chess camps which drew over 250 students to the campus over the summer of 2006.

A second activity was the Instant Challenge Workshop. The Destination Imagination teams held two such workshops this years with each of the weekends drawing about 200 elementary and secondary students from the community.

7.6 Other External Activities: There were only two international competitions our teams entered this year.

The Chess Team finished second in the International Pan-American Chess Championship

The Destination Imagination group finished with three first-place and one second-place trophy at the World Global Finals of Destination Imagination.

7.7 Contributions to UTD:

Once again, intellectual competitions brought attention and notoriety to the institution. The national championships in chess and Destination Imagination call attention to the character of students at UT Dallas and the importance of intellectual persuits. The local contributions of Destination Imagination called attention to the role of students in the community and the local legal community took notice of our success in legal mediation, mock trial, and moot court. The pre-law group believes that this increased attention has resulted in more internship and practicum experiences within the legal profession in our community and the state.

7.8 Top 3 Program / Unit Challenges:

Our continual challange is to secure adequate funding for the teams. The Student Fee Committee has agreed to take over more of the funding for Intellectual Competitions but their own budget constraints have limited its ability to fulfill that promise. The central administration has, so far, taken up the slack but we cannot expect that to continue. We also struggle to provide adequate staffing to travel with so many teams. We do not pay staff for their work with these teams and, many times, the requirement to be away from home for extended time and manage a group of young people in a strange city, is more than many staff are willing to endure.
