

CRIM 3324: Gender, Crime, and Justice

Course Description

CRIM 3324 Gender, Crime, and Justice (3 semester hours) is an analysis of the role of gender in crime and in the justice system. The emphasis is on gender differences in the commission of crime and the types of crimes committed, criminal justice processing, and the employment of women in the criminal justice professions.

The class format for this course is part lecture and part student-discussion based. Students will spend a portion of the class time engaging in interactive activities based on the readings. These activities are designed to illustrate important concepts in the text and will help prepare you for the exams. Therefore, it is in your best interest to attend class with your assigned reading materials in hand and to be prepared.

Student Learning Objectives

- Understand why the study of gender and crime is an important public policy issue.
- Separate the myths and the facts concerning female crime, using theories and explanations of female criminal behavior.
- Discuss male/female differences in the development of delinquent behavior, showing how victimization issues can be viewed in a comprehensive manner with respect to female delinquency.
- Discuss the influences that race and class play in delinquency development, and how these concepts are related to gender.
- Discuss information on the biology, psychology, and sociology of drug abuse and treatment, relating these issues to criminal justice students who will be working with alcohol and drug involved populations.
- Understand the nature of the prison environment for women in the United States.
- Explore the relevance of restorative strategies to the special needs of female victims and offenders.
- Be able to comment on pressing issues facing women who work in law enforcement and corrections.

Required Textbook

A custom text was designed for this class by Professor Maxwell. It is available at the UT Dallas Bookstore, titled Gender, Crime, and Justice 3324. Prentice Hall ISBN 0558271731. Additional readings are incorporated in this [syllabus](#) and posted on WebCT. Students are required to check WebCT weekly for readings and notices.

Exams and Assignments

No makeup tests or makeup assignments will be given. If a student is unable to take a test during scheduled test hours, the student will need to provide written notification (i.e., hospital documentation, police report, death certificate, etc) detailing the condition (e.g., illness, death in family, car accident, etc). Make up tests are not offered for weddings, personal travel, or other personal decisions unrelated to medical conditions or emergencies. Email Use

Withdrawal from Class

The administration of this institution has set deadlines for withdrawal of any college-level courses. These dates and times are published in that semester's course catalog. Student Grievance Procedures

Procedures for student grievances are found in Title V, Rules on Student Services and Activities, of the university's *Handbook of Operating Procedures*. In attempting to resolve any student grievance regarding grades, evaluations, or other fulfillments of academic responsibility, it is the obligation of the student first to make a serious effort to resolve the matter with the instructor, supervisor, administrator, or committee with whom the grievance originates (hereafter called "the respondent"). Individual faculty members retain primary responsibility for assigning grades and evaluations. If the matter cannot be resolved at that level, the grievance must be submitted in writing to the respondent with a copy of the respondent's School Dean. If the matter is not resolved by the written response provided by the respondent, the student may submit a written appeal to the School Dean. If the grievance is not resolved by the School Dean's decision, the student may make a written appeal to the Dean of Graduate or Undergraduate Education, and the dean will appoint and convene an Academic Appeals Panel. The decision of the Academic Appeals Panel is final. The results of the academic appeals process will be distributed to all involved parties. Incomplete Grade Policy

As per university policy, incomplete grades will be granted only for work unavoidably missed at the semester's end and only if 70% of the course work has been completed. An incomplete grade must be resolved within eight (8) weeks from the first day of the subsequent long semester. If the required work to complete the course and to remove the incomplete grade is not submitted by the specified deadline, the incomplete grade is changed automatically to a grade of **F**.

Religious Holy Days

The University of Texas at Dallas will excuse a student from class or other required activities for the travel to and observance of a religious holy day for a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property tax under Section 11.20, Tax Code, Texas Code Annotated.

The student is encouraged to notify the instructor or activity sponsor as soon as possible regarding the absence, preferably in advance of the assignment. The student, so excused, will be allowed to take the exam or complete the assignment within a reasonable time after the absence: a period equal to the length of the absence, up to a maximum of one week. A student who notifies the instructor and completes any missed exam or assignment may not be penalized for the absence. A student who fails to complete the exam or assignment within the prescribed period may receive a failing grade for that exam or assignment.

If a student or an instructor disagrees about the nature of the absence [i.e., for the purpose of observing a religious holy day] or if there is similar disagreement about whether the student has been given a reasonable time to complete any missed assignments or examinations, either the student or the instructor may request a ruling from the chief executive officer of the institution, or his or her designee. The chief executive officer or designee must take into account the legislative intent of TEC 51.911(b), and the student and instructor will abide by the decision of the chief executive officer or designee.
