General Course Information

Pre-requisites, Co-requisites, & other restrictions Prerequisite: Competence in basic algebra.
Calculators are not permitted. The Mathematics Readiness Exam is required on the first day of class. You have 40 minutes to complete the exam.

Course Description and Required Chapters "Functions and graphs, differentiation, maxima and minima, exponential and logarithmic functions, applications of integrals."
The main goal of the course is the presentation of some fundamental techniques of calculus along with some applications. The concepts of limits, derivatives, graphing, and integration will be developed.

Chapter 2: Nonlinear Functions (2.2, 2.4, 2.5, and 2.6 *optional*).
Chapter 3: The Derivative (3.1, 3.2, 3.3, 3.4, and 3.5).
Chapter 4: Calculating the Derivative (4.1, 4.2, 4.3, 4.4, and 4.5).

Chapter 5: Graphs and the Derivative (5.1, 5.2, 5.3, and 5.4).
Chapter 6: Applications of the Derivative (6.1, 6.2, 6.3, 6.4, 6.5, and 6.6).
Chapter 7: Integration (sections 7.1, 7.2, 7.3, 7.4, and 7.5) - time permitting.

Learning Outcomes Students will be able to formulate real world problems into mathematical statements, develop solutions to mathematical problems at the level appropriate to this course and describe or demonstrate mathematical solutions either numerically or graphically.

Learning Objectives

- 1). Given a definition of a real function, students will be able to analyze the structure of its expression and apply differentiation algorithms to determine the function derivative. Such expressions will include polynomials, exponential and logarithmic functions, products, quotients and nested expressions.
- 2). Given a narrative description of a suitable optimization application, students will be able to analyze the scenario, determine variables and relationships between variables to capture the situation, and apply calculus techniques to minimize or maximize the appropriate quantity in order to determine optimum values for controllable quantities.
- 3). Given a suitable function definition, students will be able to apply techniques of integration to evaluate the area under the graph of the function between given numerical limits.

Grading (credit) Criteria	<p>There are 10 quizzes. Each quiz is worth 25 points. The lowest two quiz scores will be dropped. (If you are absent and do not take a quiz, that quiz grade will be dropped as your lowest score.) The remaining quizzes are counted and converted to a percentage, giving a possible total of 100 points. Each regular examination is also worth 100 points. Only the best two scores from the quiz total or the regular exams will be used in the grade calculation, giving a possible total of 200 points. (In other words, the lowest of the three scores is dropped.) The comprehensive final examination is worth 200 points. This score cannot be dropped.
