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The summer 2015 semester is almost upon us and with it comes the latest installment of the eLearning Newsletter!

Last semester's survey asked about experiences you have had in online courses that stood out, both good and bad. We received 200 responses and here is how you responded to the questions:

Question 1: Please describe the most interesting/best activity you experienced in an online course at UT Dallas.

48 of your responses focused on communication with professors/classmates and examples include:

- "The most interesting thing was the Personal Finance course weekly discussions where we video chat. I found that it was
 easier to complete and understand others' points of view this way. It was a great alternative to the discussion boards that
 most online courses require."
- "The most interesting activity was the Collaborate (web conferencing) session the instructor did a review before the exam."
- "We've gotten to discuss all kinds of topics about computer mediated communication and reading everybody's blogs is sometimes fun! Some of the topics we've had to write about are about documentaries, television shows, and books that I've really enjoyed watching/reading."

46 responses identified course materials/assignments as a point of interest. Examples include:

- "I enjoyed the variety of options an online professor has given us. More than just a discussion post, some professors had videos for us to watch, some provided active external links, and some provided PowerPoints with the professor's voice.
 For me, all of these styles helped with retention."
- "Reading a capital murder trial transcript."
- "Taking the online quizzes was very helpful in regards to time management. The fact that we can take them anytime during a 1-2 week span makes it great. What also helps is how we are given practice quizzes or study guides to test our knowledge."

Question 2: Please describe a challenging experience you had in an online course at UT Dallas.

46 responses identified the online environment in general. Examples include:

- "It was very difficult to grasp the concepts without being in a classroom setting."
- "Based on my personal learning style, I just learn more and get more (education-wise) from a face to face learning environment than the online one."
- · "Typically (online) courses are more demanding."

37 responses identified communication challenges. Examples given:

- "I think the most challenging task has been waiting on email responses from some professors."
- "It takes some time for other people to respond to your questions."

31 responses identified difficulty keeping up with the course schedule. Examples include:

- "Remembering deadlines. When other classes get busier, it's easy to forget you're enrolled in an online course for a week or two, to devastating results. Out of sight, out of mind, I suppose. It's amazing how useful even a once-a-week meeting is
- "Remembering due dates I haven't missed one yet, but I am constantly unsure and have to go back in my planner to keep checking when things are due."

Technical difficulties were listed by 20 respondents. Here are some examples:

- "There was one time when I couldn't connect... internet traffic. I just had to try several times and it was fine. Sometimes it
 takes several attempts to mute or un-mute the phone, especially when large numbers of people are trying to do the same
 thing at the same time... all normal stuff."
- "Making sure the internet connection is fast enough while I'm taking any quizzes or tests."
- "It took me about one week to get used to eLearning. That's the only challenging aspect. Once you get to know about

eLearning, it is quite good."

BIS 3190 - Library Research Skills

Learning proper research skills and information literacy is imperative in college. BIS 3190 helps students effectively explore and examine the library tools necessary to succeed in class. Developed by an instruction librarian at McDermott Library, BIS 3190 provides a step-by-step introduction to resources and best practices for student researchers. Students will learn how to locate information within Eugene McDermott Library as well as the internet. Topics include fine-tuning research topics, conducting research using scholarly resources, and organizing information for a paper. Plagiarism, copyright and citation management are also included.

The material is flexible enough that first-year students could easily complete the course while juniors and seniors will still find the information beneficial. McDermott librarians teach this course.

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Meet Our Faculty



Dr. Umit Gurun

Dr. Umit Gurun is an Associate Professor of Accounting at UTD. He also serves as an associate editor at Management Science (http://pubsonline.informs.org/journal/mnsc). His current research areas include financial media and asset prices, advertising financial products, immigration networks in financial markets, and patent litigation. He received his PhD from Michigan State University and was a visiting faculty at the University of Texas at Austin (2010-2011) and Harvard University (2014).

Dr. Gurun currently teaches ACCT 6344, Financial Statement Analysis at UT Dallas. This course analyzes financial statements for evaluating firm performance and risk. Topics include interpretation of financial statements and footnotes, managers' incentives for earnings manipulation, comparative analysis of firms, and ethics in financial reporting. Students will have the opportunity to develop skills and understanding of the integration of strategy, accounting, economics and finance. The course also provides a framework for business analysis and valuation using financial statement data in a variety of business decisions.



Chris Edwards

Chris Edwards works in the Eugene McDermott Library at UTD. Mr. Edwards is an Instruction Librarian for the First-Year Experience Students and the Liaison to the Veteran Services Center. He teaches workshops on RefWorks, a citation management software that is available to all UTD personnel, students, and alumni. He also teaches BIS 3190, Library Research Skills, since the course was launched in the spring of 2010.

Mr. Edwards has been working in one academic library or another since his freshman year at Texas Tech University. He loves hearing interesting questions and surprising answers, and enjoys helping and getting to know people.

Mr. Edwards received his Bachelor's Degree in 2003 in Theatre Arts and English from Texas Tech University and received his Master of Library Science from The University of North Texas. He is a member of the American Library Association, the Texas Library Association, and the Theatre Library Association.
