Course Description

Today's economic trend is business beyond borders. We are witnessing an era of internationalization as a result of advanced communication and transportation technologies, and ease of trade barriers. By introducing the concept and dynamics of international business, this course specifically examines the main players of this phenomenon: multinational corporations (MNCs). Managers require complex tools and unique capabilities to be more competitive in international business. They need to effectively respond to international market opportunities while mitigating the risks of failure. Adopting a truly global perspective of management, this course presents current thinking in international business theory and practice. Topics covered include international trade and investment theories, country environments (e.g., political, legal, financial, and economic), culture, foreign direct investment, international strategy, and corporate ethics.

Student Learning Objectives/Outcomes

- **1.** *Cross-cultural differences* in an international business context; demonstrate understanding of organizational & interpersonal implications using relevant cultural frameworks.
- **2.** *Human values* and the ability to make judgments based on *ethical considerations* in areas affecting or affected by international business such as bribery/corruption, employment practices/labor conditions, contract disputes, intellectual property rights, and environmental degradation.

De-densify the Classrooms

In consideration of the COVID-19 delta variant in North Texas, **Traditional** classes and the inperson component of **Blended/Hybrid** classes generally will be taught at lower density during the first three weeks of the fall 2021 semester, subject to re-evaluation on Wednesday, Sept. 8.

- 1. The current class schedule will not change.
- 2. Faculty instructors will have the flexibility to address classroom density concerns while maintaining face-to-face instruction for all students registered in **Traditional** or **Blended/Hybrid** courses. Students enrolled in **Traditional** and **Blended/Hybrid** courses will have at least one in-person experience per week in each course during this time.
- 3. If the faculty instructor is comfortable with the current density in the classroom, the instructor may choose to continue with typical face-to-face delivery, as specified in CourseBook.
- 4. If there is concern about class density, the instructor may implement class attendance policies that result in students attending class in person on alternating days. Following are examples:
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 - of **Blended/Hybrid** courses in the **HyFlex** modality, in which students rotate through the classroom in cohorts assigned by the instructor. Faculty members would have the option to ask students not to sit in the first row or two.
 - i. Students enrolled in MWF courses would attend class one day per week: one-third of enrolled students each on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. When not in the classroom, students would attend class synchronously online via Microsoft Teams and/or asynchronously, as determined by the instructor. Class content and materials covered during in-person class sessions would be easily available to those students not present in the face-to-face classroom.
 - ii. Students enrolled in TR courses would attend class one day per week: one-half of enrolled students each on Tuesday and Thursday. When not in the classroom, students would attend class synchronously online via Microsoft Teams and/or asynchronously, as determined by the instructor. Class content and materials covered during in-person class sessions would be easily available to those students not present in the face-to-face classroom.
 - iii. Students enrolled in courses that meet one day per week would attend class in person every other week. When not in the classroom, students would attend class synchronously online via Microsoft Teams and/or asynchronously, as determined by the instructor. Class content and materials covered during in-person class sessions would be easily available to those students not present in the face-to-face classroom.
- b. Teach **Traditional** seminar courses in a larger room, e.g., a unit's conference room or outdoors.
- c. Modify **Traditional** laboratory courses. For example, lab check-in could be accomplished in two consecutive one-hour segments of the lab period. A lab experiment could be extended over two consecutive weeks.
- 5. In advance of the first day of classes, instructors are encouraged to communicate with their students any plans for adapting their course to reduce classroom density. Although students may not yet have access to the course's eLearning site, the class roster in eLearning is regularly updated and synchronized with Orion. Instructors can communicate with students using the "Announcements" and "UT Dallas Email" options in eLearning before the semester begins. Be sure to select the "Send a copy of this announcement immediately" option when sending an Announcement.

Projects

- There will be three tests. Tests may be based on assigned readings (textbook and other articles) as well as all other materials covered in class. Test 1 and 2 are at least partially completed within the Business Strategy Game. Test 3 is done outside of the BSG. In theory, some test questions may come from information in the textbook. Test 1 shall include Quiz 1 within the BSG and other questions from the course. Test 2 shall include Quiz 2 within BSG, questions about Factor Analysis results dealing with Hofstede's 6-D model as well as additional questions. Test 3 has 3 sections one section deals with the Student Learning Outcome Objectives for the class, one section deals with interpretation of the Participation results, and the third section deals with information from the lectures, talks, and videos. Portions of Tests 1 and 2 is different for each and every student. If you do not understand something in your textbook, please ask questions about it so I can clarify for you. If you have concerns about a project please let me know & an alternative might be able to be arranged.
- We have a series of self assessment exercises which provide you with individualized feedback which shall be used with the Active Assignments [like attendance assignments with 1 every week], provide material to be used for Test 2, and interpreted by YOU on Test 3. They need to pass multiple validity checks and should be done seriously. Five years after graduation alumni have deemed them to be the most valuable part of the class. Failure to complete them accurately may result in a grade reduction. ALL of the Extra Credit opportunities shall be related to them.
- 1. You will form groups of you, yourself, and you and work over the course of the semester on the Business Strategy Game. In the business strategy game you and your teammates manage a hypothetical organization for 10 years. You are competing both with other students in your league as well as individuals from around the world. While there are suggestions for "gaming the system" on-line they don't take in to account that the newest version of the game adjusts itself to how seriously it believes you are playing the game.
- 2. Active Assignments all students are expected to read the relevant chapters and participate actively in the class throughout the semester. This part will be assessed based on weekly assignments which may include application of course material or uploading a file. Individuals have 2 weeks to complete each assignment.
- (00 points): If 16 or more Active Assignments are completed;

- (05 points): If 15 Active Assignments are completed;
- (10 points): If 14 Active Assignments are completed;
- (15 points): If 13 Active Assignments are completed;
- (20 points): If 12 or fewer Active Assignments are completed.

3. Individual Case Write-up

Each student is supposed to turn in one individual two-page essay (double spaced) on a closing case of his/her own choosing. This assignment is to be done on an individual basis. An electronic copy can be submitted via eLearning at the beginning of the class when the chapter for that closing case is to be discussed. So the deadline is relatively flexible per students' choosing.

Every chapter of the Global textbook has a closing case, which can have significant theoretical, practical, and ethical implications. Once you pick a closing case, you are expected to

- 1) apply the theories and concepts learned from the current and other chapters;
- 2) provide critical thinking beyond the closing case as there may not be just one correct answer; and
- 3) present convincing reasoning, helpful suggestions, and coherent arguments;

The emphasis of the grading will be on: 1) closeness to concepts and theories, 2) creativeness and depth of thinking, and 3) coherence in reasoning (not bullet points).

- √ (5 points): If the essay has all the main components and has met the above three emphases;
- ✓ (4 points): If the essay has few of the main components and has not met most of the above three emphases (e.g., used little concepts and theories, used mostly bullet points, provided no meaningful suggestions, etc.);
- ✓ (2 points): If the essay has only one of the main components or has met only one of the above three emphases;
- ✓ (0 points): If the essay has not been turned in or does not follow any of the instructions.

To ensure a good quality, each student is strongly urged to start the preparation process early.

4. Voice Over Powerpoint – MNC or Academic Topic

Each individual [with 0, 1, or 2 other individuals] will research one real world MNC, identify challenges or issues facing it, and develop solutions to the challenges or issues. Each may address the issues regarding the following topics:

- Political and legal
- Cultural and ethical
- Firm resources and capabilities
- Mergers & acquisitions (M&A)
- Market selection and entry mode selection
- International human resource management
- Others

You shall turn in a Voice Over Powerpoint presentation that shall be from 10 to 20 minutes in length. It may deal with an MNC or be on an academic topic of your choice with global implications. Your report should include the following sections:

- Introduction
- Analysis

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- Identify and thoroughly analyze the critical challenges or issues using the concepts and theories learned in class.
- Also state why resolving such issues are critical to the company.
- Recommendations
 - Provide specific and feasible strategic solutions and/or recommendations linked to the theories and concepts learned in class, which may be answers and explanations to the following questions: What should the company have done? Why? What would be the challenges in applying those recommendations?
 - Please note that you should also consider the costs and benefits of your recommendations, as well as limitations.
- Conclusion & Learning outcomes
- References

The presentation will emphasize preparedness, theoretical connections, logical flow, time control, and class interaction. Members who fail to participate in the presentation will have points deducted.

Three grading emphases: 1) effectiveness in applying concepts and theories, 2) relevance of recommendations and level of theoretical backing, and 3) coherence in reasoning throughout the report (not bullet points).

- ✓ (10 points): If the presentation has the main components and have met the above three emphases, while with good preparations and engaging interactions;
- ✓ (8 points): If the presentation has most of the main components and have met two of the above three emphases, while with OK preparations and some engaging interactions;
- ✓ (7 points): If the presentation has some of the main components and have met one of the above three emphases, while with somewhat mediocre preparations and few interactions;
- ✓ (4 points): If the presentation has few of the main components and have met one or none of the above three emphases, while with poor preparations and few interactions;
- ✓ (0 points): If the presentation is not turned in, or if the presentation is not prepared, or if the case analysis is not on the right one.

To ensure a good quality, each group is strongly urged to start the preparation process at least to the designated group case discussion date.

General Class Policies

Learning is an active process. I believe that it should be transformational. I am a Professor, not a teacher or a lecturer. Please be at each class on time and prepared. Classes will be a combination of lecture, discussion, and exercises – you should actively participate in each part. You are responsible for the assigned readings and what is covered in class.

Common Courtesy: You are expected to be courteous during class time. Please respect your fellow students, professor, and guest speakers and arriving punctually to class. If you have concerns about a project or some other aspect of the class please approach me so that we can work identify and work out a solution.

Classroom Conduct Requirements Related to COVID-19
