This course focuses on the symptoms, causes, assessment, and treatment of abnormal behavior. Students will become familiar with the nature of several mental disorders, with emphasis on the DSM-5 criteria and the fundamental etiological theories for each disorder studied.

Description

eLearning

Perusall

Perusall helps you master readings faster, understand the material better, and get more out of your classes. To achieve this goal, you will be collaboratively annotating the textbook and completing discussion/application assignments with others in your class. The help you'll get and provide your classmates (even if you don't know anyone personally) will get you past confusions quickly and will make the process more fun. While you read, you'll receive rapid answers to your questions, help others resolve their questions (which also helps you learn), and advise me how to make class time most productive.

Perusall assignments will be linked through eLearning. You will not need to create a separate account. Assignments will include reading and annotating the textbook, discussing videos, and reading and discussing additional readings.

PeerWise

This semester we will be using PeerWise as a place for you to create, share and evaluate assessment questions with your classmates. Start by visiting PeerWise here: http://peerwise.cs.auckland.ac.nz/at/?utdallas_edu. To set up an account click the "Registration" link and follow the prompts. All you need to do is choose a username and a password for your PeerWise account.


Assignments

Assignment	Description
Quizzes	Each module will have an online quiz associated with it. The quizzes will cover the assigned readings and lecture material for each module topic. Questions will be drawn from a random question bank and each quiz will be different from any other person's quiz. Quizzes are timed and you will have one attempt to take them within the allotted time window and cannot be made up. That means that while you may have time to look through your notes to answer <i>some</i> questions, you will not have enough time to look at your notes for all questions. Please study and prepare for the quizzes. At the end of the semester, I will drop two of your lowest quiz grades.
Final Exam	All students have to take a cumulative final exam at the end of the semester. The exam will cover all topics from the course and will be similar in style of questions as the module quizzes. The Exam will be administered at the UTD Testing center. You must reserve your exam appointment at least 72 hours in advance (https://ets.utdallas.edu/testing-center/students
Reading Assignments	The textbook for this class and reading assignments are available through a collaborative annotation/discussion platform, Perusall. For each chapter covered, you will have a reading assignment to complete in Perusall. To successfully complete the assignment, please read the chapter and add comments, annotations, and questions. Please read early! Your grade on Perusall assignments can be improved by accessing the readings multiple times, reading in small chunks (rather than all at once) and by responding to the questions of others. Come back to the reading often and check on the comments made by others, try to answer their questions, or respond to their posts. I will drop your lowest 2 Perusall reading grades when calculating your final grade. Be sure to look over the Perusall information posted on eLearning. Please ONLY access Perusall assignments through the links in eLearning.
Syllabus Discussion	To help you get more familiar with the course syllabus and Perusall, you will interact with the syllabus in Perusall by asking questions, making annotations, etc. If you complete this assignment by actively participating in the discussion, you will earn a bonus of 0.5% of the final grade.
PeerWise Questions	We will be using PeerWise as a place for you to create, share, and evaluate multiple choice questions over course topics with your classmates. For assignment, you will be responsible for creating 2-3 original questions per chapter and answering and rating at least 20 questions from your classmates. Practicing answering questions over course material will help you be better prepared for exams, so I encourage you to answer as many questions as you can when you study. I may select a few top questions to include on the final exam. More information is provided on eLearning.
Class Participation	There will be several activities during the semester for which you can earn class participation points. The activities must be completed during class time and cannot be made up if you miss class. At the end of the semester, I will drop two of your lowest participation grades.
Research Experience Credit	One requirement of all students enrolled in this class is completion of two research exposure credits. Details about this requirement can be found on a separate handout distributed on the first day of class or on the course eLearning page, and in the BBS Information Center on eLearning. Research exposure credits must be completed by the date found on the REC instruction sheet or your course grade will be lowered. For each credit you fail to complete, your course grade will be reduced by 1/3 of a letter grade (e.g., for 2 missing credits, a B+ will become a B-).

I will not respond to emails asking me to "round up," to change grades for any reason other than an error, or to reconsider my grading policy as described in the syllabus. Making adjustments to grades of only some students is unfair to other students and would require me to act unethically.

Course Format

Overview: The course is designed to be a traditional, synchronous, face-to-face class. No asynchronous option is available and students are expected to attend live class lectures, participate in class discussion and activities, and complete in-person assessments.

COVID-19 De-densification: UTD has announced that for the first three weeks of school, all classes will be de-densified with only half of the students attending each scheduled course day.

To accommodate this change, the course format will change for these weeks. Students will complete reading assignments and quizzes online. Lecture recordings will also be posted covering important or difficult concepts. Students are expected to watch these lectures during the class meeting they are not attending in-person. During in-person meetings, we will engage in discussion, demonstrations, and application activities. The live class meetings will not be recorded as all students will have a chance to participate during their assigned in-person class days. There will also be participation activities for which grade points will be assigned. Students who cannot attend class due to. extenuating circumstances will be able to complete participation activities on their own. However, I strongly encourage you to come to class as you will learn more and will also be able to ask questions. We will record attendance in each class for contact tracing purposes, but no grade points will be assigned for attendance.

If UTD removes the de-densification requirement, the class format will change to a traditional, live, in-person format.

All course work will be due by the start of the class on Mondays. I will drop your lowest two Quizzes, Application Assignments, and Reading assignments. If you submit one of these late, you will receive a zero and it will be one of the two grades dropped. No late or make-up work (including quizzes) is allowed in this course. Each quiz will be available on eLearning for about a week, meaning that you can take the quiz at any time during that period. Quizzes started before the deadline but submitted after the deadline will NOT be accepted.

Attendance/ Participation Attendance is not required but I highly encourage you to come to class and participate as much as you can so that you can get the most out of this class. There will be several class participation activities that will make up your class participation grade. I will collect attendance daily to help with COVID-19 contact tracing.
