General Core Area 050 Creative Arts

Description: Courses in this category focus on the appreciation and analysis of creative artifacts and works of the human imagination.

Courses involve the synthesis and interpretation of artistic expression and enable critical, creative, and innovative

communication about works of art.

This course fulfills a requirement in the Texas Core Curriculum as it is offered at UT Dallas.

Recognize and discuss primary music terms, elements of music (pitch, harmony, rhythm, timbre, form, etc.) and identify characteristics of these terms and elements in musical excerpts (COM);

- Use appropriate musical terminology to describe style attributes of music from various historical eras and recognize them in musical excerpts (CT);
- Describe music as a form of expression that may reflect personal creativity and interpretation, and that may be influenced by social, historical, political, religious, and cultural contexts for both the performance and consumption of music (SR);
- Discuss and identify principal musical eras and composers from each era, their basic biographical information, and examples of their principal compositions, (COM);
- ❖ Write music reviews using the understanding and insights gained through participation in the course (CT); and,
- ❖ Analyze music. (CT).

General Course Information

An introduction to the elements and basic forms of music with an emphasis on Western (European and American) art music. This course is designed to increase students' understanding of music as a creative art form within historical and social context. Engaged listening, methods of analytical and aesthetic appreciation will be applied to musical examples with discussions in the arts and "real world" environments.

SPECIFIC COURSE INFORMATION

Class content and information will be a combination of discussion boards, quizzes and exams, graded assignments, assigned listening and textbook readings, concert attendance (internet and otherwise) and research. Students will be required to attend live and/or view internet live and pre-recorded performances. Tests, quizzes, and assignments will contain references to all course content and information. There may be Teams presentations by the professor to discuss class content and/or answer course content questions from student inquiries. All recordings will be available in Teams. Students will be responsible for the information from the recordings. The sessions will be announced in advance and students **may** attend any of the Teams sessions **but are not required to attend.** All course materials will be posted in eLearning. *Assignments, Readings, Tests, Academic Calendar, Lecture Topics are Subject to Change.*

Grading Criteria

Chapter Quizzes (49pts)

There will a chapter quiz for each of the 49 chapters we cover during the semester. Typically, we will cover three chapters a week and the quizzes will be available during the corresponding week up to that Sunday. All quizzes will be timed and automatically graded. Each quiz will be worth 1pt towards the final course points of 100points. The quizzes cannot be taken after the deadline has passed.

Prelude and Listening Quizzes (10pts)

These will be six prelude quizzes and four listening quizzes at 1pt.

Final (10pts)

Concert Journals/Music Reviews(8pts)

You will be required to watch/listen to two internet full length concert performances of which both will be **classical**. If you are not sure if a concert will count, ask or email me. The concert journals/reviews of each performance will be submitted using the supplied template in eLearning and submitted in eLearning. Journals not submitted with the template will receive no credit. Journal 1 = 4 pts; Journal 2 = 4pts; The second journal should be detailed as the semester progresses; therefore, the points are increased.

Assignments (20pts)

There are two graded assignments:

- Pre-analysis assignment Credit for submitting the assignment. If the assignment is not turned in, it will result in a 3pt deduction of final grade.
- ♦ Analysis (10pts)

A detailed analysis of the pre-analysis piece which will include a short biography of the composer.

◆ Research paper (10pts)

The research paper will: 1. discuss, contrast, and compare one musical form across two music time periods; 2. identify and discuss a major representative work and composer from either period that epitomizes that form.
