Course Description

An introduction to medical sociology, this class examines the social causes of health and disease, health and illness behaviors, medicalization and the social construction of illness, global health disparities, history of and current practices in medical school and the health professions, and the formulation and implementation of health policies and programs.

- Be able to use concepts developed from different disciplines to analyze relevant research/writings.
