#### **Course Description**

This course studies the powerful and often painful processes of globalization with both historical depth and contemporary width. The course examines how economic globalization contributes to the bubbles and crashes in the financial world and triggers environmental crises and societal pitfalls. It also explores the interaction between culture and economy, as displayed in various parts of the world. In an increasingly borderless world, the Internet, global finance, and multinational corporations continue to weaken the power of nation states. At the same time, national and local cultures resist, revise, or painfully accommodate foreign influence. The instructor and students study how various countries respond to globalization reshaped by international business and powered by the digital revolution. They will compare different economic systems, especially stock market capitalism vs. welfare capitalism. Topics also include migration, global elites, cross-cultural communication, conflict resolution, and financial warfare.
