COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will explore China's quest for "modernity". It will begin by examining Chinese society in the year 1600, just before the conquest of China by the nomadic Manchu tribesmen of the north. An autobiographical account by the Emperor Kangxi (1661-1722), one of China's most powerful and illustrious emperors, will provide some insight into the economic, political, and intellectual accomplishments achieved under the Qing or Manchu rulers (1644-1911). The course will then examine the Chinese responses to the internal stresses caused by population explosion and the external threats posed by the Western nations in the 19th century. It will identify those factors which led to the rise of the Communists, describe the nature of the Communist revolution and of Chinese society today. It will culminate in a study of those events leading to China's emergence as Asia's new superpower.
