Modern Japanese History

This course is a survey of Japanese history from 1600 to the present day. It is divided into three units. The first unit begins with the unification of Japan by the great samurai lord Tokugawa Ieyasu in 1600. The Tokugawa rulers inaugurated a period of almost 300 years of peace in Japan. Yet, what did Japan's elite warriors or samurai do during 300 years of peacetime? The class will look at the ethos of Bushido or the "Way of the Warrior" as it was articulated during the Tokugawa period. The Tokugawa era (1600-1868) was also the most creative epoch in the development of Japanese art and literature.

The second unit will examine the Japan's "response" to its encounter with the West in the 19th century. The approach of Commodore Perry's "Black Ships" to Japan's shores unleashed great forces of social and political change which culminated in the restoration of the Meiji emperor and the dissolution of the samurai class.

The final unit of the course discusses Japan's role in World War II, the American occupation of Japan and Japan's economic miracle in the post-war years. This unit will also explore Japan's contemporary popular culture, focusing in particular on baseball and anime.

The final examination will be a take home essay.
