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General Course Information

This course is an introduction to twentieth century
Latin American politics organized around four main themes.

1. The Legacy of Colonization 2. Patterns of Economic
Development and the Implication for

Political Stability 3. Revolutionary Movements and Democratization 4. U.S. Latin American Relations In order to gain a basic understanding of the Latin American reality, a knowledge of history and political patterns is necessary.

<u>Learning Objectives</u> Course content is designed to develop students' international awareness and analytical ability. Course assignments aim to develop students' abilities to analyze world affairs, to formulate arguments, and to read critically. Specifically, students should be able to use the historical experiences of different Latin American countries to understand broad patterns of development and change in the region.
