Course Description:

This course is designed to provide the student with an overview of the Middle East. We cannot hope to provide an in-depth examination of the geography, culture, languages, literature, religions, and history of the Middle East in one undergraduate course! Specific focus will be on Middle East patterns as reflected in the political divisions and countries that comprise the region. Whenever possible, significant attention will be given to specific cultural and historical events that have helped shape the current structure of this Middle East. It is a fascinating area of the world, often characterized by wonderfully rich and diverse cultures, the birthplace of monotheistic religions (Christianity, Islam and Judaism), the home to varied tribes and ethnicities, and the location of unique geographical formations. Sadly, it has also been an area historically replete with violence and conflict. The primary objective of the course is to enable the student to comprehend the vastness of the Middle East and explore the major divisions of places, peoples, and politics comprising this unique area of the world.

Learning Objectives:

At the end of this class, students will be able to:

- 1. Define the geographical area of the Middle East, naming specific countries, places, physical attributes, and primary population centers.
- 2. Understand and discuss the historical development of the Middle East, from the "cradle of civilization" to modern cities of technology and sophistication.
- 3. Compare and contrast the major cultures, religions and ethnicities often observed in the Middle East.
- 4. Describe the various unique geographical regions of the Middle East.
- 5. Understand and discuss the primary political issues in the Middle East that continue to be the roots of conflict in this area.
- 5. Discuss the future of the Middle East, and impact of this important region on the economic and political security of the United States.

Grade Evaluation:

Grades will be evaluated based on the following criteria:

- 1. <u>**Two Major Examinations**</u> (Examination #1 and Examination #2). Each exam will constitute 30% of your final grade and cover all class lectures, discussion, reading assignments and materials designated on the schedule previous to each examination. The examinations will consist of a combination of true/false, matching, multiple choice, fill-in-the-blank and short-essay questions. 60% of final grade
- 2. **Four Quizzes**. A total of **five** short quizzes will be presented in class consisting of multiple choice and/or fill-in-the-blank questions. The lowest grade for the five quizzes will be eliminated; therefore, each quiz is worth 5% of your final grade.

3. <u>One Written (5 to 7 page) Report</u>. The student will present a 5 to 7 page, double-spaced, typed paper reporting on any issue, topic or experience directly relating to the Middle East. The topic may include any aspect of the culture, history, people, geography, literature, or political issue involving the Middle East. Much more on this assignment will be discussed in class. Reports are due on <u>April 29, 2013</u>. Late papers will <u>NOT</u> be accepted.

4. <u>**Class Discussion.**</u> Since this class is an upper division seminar, students are expected to come to class well prepared to discuss the previous readings assigned for that day. Comments should be thoughtful, analytical, and well-substantiated. Rash statements made without support will not be tolerated, and will deter from a positive grade. Therefore, please think before you speak!
