Course Pre-Requisites, Co-requisites, and/or Other Restrictions:

This course is restricted to Pre-Health students only; instructor permission is required.

Course Description:

This one-hour course centers on a series of guest speakers and aims to help Pre-Health students to learn about a broad array of health careers. Students can develop a holistic appreciation for the healthcare industry and an understanding of the skills, education and experience required for various healthcare fields.

Those taking Pre-Health Career Exploration should become especially well prepared to select courses and activities that prepare them to succeed in professional school. Furthermore and most importantly, students will have opportunities to refine their interests through conversations with professionals and to discern what health field may suit them best over a multi-decade career.

Speakers will include representatives from a broad range of fields including medical, dental, pharmacy, optometry, physical therapy, occupational therapy, counseling, podiatry, nutrition and more.

Student Learning Objectives:

- 1) Describe a broad array of career options for Pre-Health students.
- 2) Describe the requirements for admission into various health professions programs.
- 3) Identify interesting career fields and appreciate the roles within a field.
- 4) Develop an understanding of the environments healthcare professionals work in and daily work responsibilities.

- 1) Attend every class session.
- 2) Exercise professionalism and respect when dealing with the many industry professionals you meet during the course.
- 3) Demonstrate collegiate writing: formal and organized composition.

Indicate the specific career in health care that you are discussing (i.e. physical therapist, dentist)
