#### **Grading Policy**

- 1. Archaeological site report- Write a 8-10 paged (double-spaced) summary of a site that you have researched. It must include at least one original site report, and sources used must be scholarly, that is peer-reviewed journals or scholarly texts. The site must be approved by the instructor before the report is written. Discuss the evidence that has been offered and whether or not you think that the conclusions are based upon solid archaeological theory and technique. This paper is to be submitted to Turnitin.com- a plagiarism detection software program.. For this reason, make certain that you paraphrase comments of other authors and do not quote lengthy passages. Worth 30% of grade. The Turnitin.com Similarity Score must not be above 10%.

  2. A midterm test on lecture notes and assigned readings from the texts. It is worth 30% of grade..
- 3. A final paper to be written on the last day of class. Worth 30% of grade.
- 4. Attendance/Participation is <u>worth 10% of your final grade</u>. Attendance will be taken randomly on 20 occasions. If your signature does not appear on the sheet for the day attendance was taken, that counts as an absence. People who arrive more than 15 minutes late lose the right to
