GENERAL COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

This course is designed to provide students in the PACT program with an introduction to Texas's State government and politics. The course covers topics related to state government and the public policy process that are especially relevant for students preparing for a career in medicine. The course begins with a discussion of Texas political cultures and economy of Texas within the framework of federalism, and the Texas Constitution. The course then proceeds to a discussion of political parties, elections, state government structures and public policy. While a large component of the materials will be communicated through lecture, there should be ample opportunity for seminar-type discussions. There will also be guest presentations and panel discussions scheduled strategically during the semester. It is crucial that the student will have read the material prior to class and be prepared to discuss.

Course Requirements and **Grading Criteria**

There will be two tests and a final exam scheduled over the course of the semester. The tests will be short answer and short essay in content. The final exam will be a take-home essay exam. All tests and exams will be weighted 30% each, and in-class participation will count 10%. The grading scale is the standard undergraduate A, A-, B+, B, B-, C+, C, C-, D and F.

- 1. Provide examples of and apply important theoretical and scholarly approaches to understanding state institution's behavior, citizen involvement and interactions between citizens and institutions of government.
- 2. Analyze and appreciate historical trends in development of state governmental institutions and their constitutional foundations
- 3. Identify, describe and analyze various mechanisms of citizen political involvement.
