#### **General Course Information**

#### **Pre-requisites/Co-requisites:**

#### **Course Description:**

Chinese calligraphy is an art of self-cultivation and self-expression. It is one of China's greatest high art forms and is a cornerstone of Chinese culture. This course will explore the five more major styles of Chinese calligraphy and how to write Chinese calligraphy.

# **Student Learning Objectives/Outcomes:**

This course will discuss the history and artistic features of each script of the Chinese calligraphy, focusing on the form, style, features and writing methods of each calligraphy script. As an abstract visual art, even as a form of image construction, we will explain their shape structures and overall layout, help our students to understand the writing procedures and materials, master appreciation methods, and study their relatively independent formalist Aesthetics. However, our students are not required to recognize and remember each character. You can attend the class even without any Chinese language experience.

Through this program, students will get a cognitive understanding of the classification of each style of calligraphy and be able to copy the traditional calligraphy copybooks and write the cursive script. These copying and writing practices will focus on multiple genres in order to broaden the students' understanding of the potential of calligraphy art. They can help students enlighten their creative power, using these art elements and skills in their graphic design and animation design.

## **Required Texts & Materials:**

Some of the writing tools and the calligraphy copybooks will be provided by the instructor. Each student should have some of the practice papers, such as roll napkin paper, blotting paper, or rice paper etc. and Chinese calligraphy ink.

Students can appreciate and read the Chinese calligraphy works and texts online.
