Grading Policy

Research Paper (50%): Choose a research topic from one of the above lecture topics or from a topic approved by the instructor, and write a 10-12 page double-spaced paper (excluding bibliography and title page) on it. Since many of these topics are rather broad, please make certain that your topic is approved beforehand. This is worth 50% of your grade and a grading rubric will be posted on e-learning. Please consult the "Reference and Bibliography Style Sheet" that you were given on the first day of class. Your paper is to be submitted to "Turnitin.com" – a plagiarism detection service. Give me a hard copy by the beginning of class. I do not accept on-line submissions by email. I reserve the right to refuse papers not submitted to Turnitin.com, and/or submitted late to Turnitin.com or to me. This paper is due by class time on November 19.

<u>Tests (40%):</u> Throughout the semester, to help you keep up with readings, there will be five tests. They will be worth 10 points each. I will count the best four out of five.

Attendance and class participation (10%) is worth 10% of your final grade. Attendance will be taken randomly on 10 occasions. If your signature does not appear on the sheet for the day attendance was taken, that counts as an absence. People who arrive more than 15 minutes late lose the right to sign the attendance sheet. Similarly people who leave early without permission will also lose their attendance grade for the day. Participation is a must for this course. Grades will be assigned as follows:
