

HIST 4359.001 Gender and Ethnicity in Colonial Latin America
MW 530-645

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This course will survey the recent secondary literature on gender and ethnicity in the colonial era of Latin American history. We will begin with a brief overview of daily life and the interactions between different cultures in the colonial era, the focus will shift to student-directed, in-depth examinations of different groups, regions, and periods across Latin America.

REQUIREMENTS:

GRADING:
