Course Description

Understanding Dance offers the student an opportunity to develop an awareness and appreciation of dance in its cultural, social, and artistic contexts through explorations in dance aesthetics, history, and the creative process. Students will study dance through lecture, viewing and critiquing of live and video dance performances, readings, participatory study of selected dance genres, exposure to the art of theatrical production, and exploration of the creative process. This class will view dance, talk about dance, and explore dance as a living embodiment of our culture and ourselves.

ART AND PERFORMANCE PROGRAM LEARNING OUTCOMES: Students will be able to:

- 1. **Describe and apply methodology processes** Students will be able to describe and apply basic methodologies and processes by which aesthetic judgments are made
- Demonstrate effective communication skills Students will demonstrate effective oral and written communication skills
- 3. **Demonstrate knowledge of principles and history** Students will demonstrate a broad knowledge of the principles and history of at least one major form of artistic expression
- Gain experience and expertise Students will gain experience and expertise in at least one area of the creative and performing arts

Student Learning Objectives/Outcomes

- Given text readings, video viewings, and class discussions, students will demonstrate recognition of significant historical dance figures and periods and selected world dance genres.
- Drawing from texts, viewing of live and video recorded dance, discussion and lecture, students will demonstrate an understanding of the creative process and of dance as an art form by

completing and experiencing classroom assignments, movement workshops and activities, and presentations.

- Students will be able to analyze live performances by applying fundamental concepts of Space/Time/Energy as discussed in class and course texts.
- Students will be able to synthesize and present research on social dance forms and a prominent figure in dance.

Course Policies

Class Participation

<u>Participation and Attendance</u>: 6 points (18 points during summer sessions) will be awarded at the beginning of class for the anticipated participation of the student. The student must participate according to activities planned for each class session. Participation includes paying attention, taking notes in class, participating in and being prepared for discussions and activities. Failure to fulfill any of the preceding requirements will result in a deduction in points already given.

Please note that this is an introductory class. Although students in the class will have a wide range of dance experience, class participation grades are not based on technical mastery, previous knowledge, or on comparison with other class members. Participation grades are based on positive and active contribution; engaging fully in class discussion and activities with a positive and supportive attitude toward the material and your classmates. No electronic devices are allowed in the classroom unless approved for use by the instructor. 6 points will be deducted from the daily participation/attendance grade for each violation of this policy.

<u>Attendance</u>: Attendance is critical to your success in this class! Please see the instructor in advance if you know that you must miss a class. Absence from class is not an excuse for late work or failure to be prepared for the next lesson. Exchanging email addresses with a classmate is suggested as a way to keep informed in case of unforeseen circumstances. You may also email the instructor with questions regarding the course and course materials. Students will be allowed **one** excused absence (except during summer sessions, no absences are allowed) over the course of the semester. Excused absences **are; religious holidays, illness, medical emergency, accident, death in the immediate family, University sponsored activities (athletic teams, et...) & MUST be accompanied by official written documentation. Absences excused per above guidelines will not affect student grade. Students will still be required to complete assignments for missed days by the required due date. Each class has a value of 6 points (18 points during summer sessions).**

Tardiness: A student is tardy if he/she arrives after official starting class time (8:30am).

Late arrivals will result in a 1 point deduction if student arrives after class has begun up to the first 15 minutes of class. An additional 1 point deduction will be taken in 15 minute increments thereafter. For

example, late arrivals from 8:45-9:00am will result in a 2 point deduction and deducted points will progress every 15 minutes up until 12:00pm. If student arrives after 12:00pm no points will be awarded that day. If student arrives after 15 minutes into a movement practicum session it may not be safe for the student to participate and he/she may be asked to sit out and observe, incurring a <u>further</u> point deduction from the movement practicum grade.

<u>Classroom Assignments</u>: Assignments include study questions, readings, research assignments, presentations, and any other assignment given by the instructor for a specific class period.

<u>Required Written Assignments</u>: All written assignments must be turned in through eLearning, but student must be prepared to discuss assignments in class.

<u>Research Assignments for Chapters 5, 6, and 9</u>: Students are required to pick two out of these three assignments to submit. The instructor will assign specific time periods for students to choose significant figures. Details for each assignment will be given on eLearning.

<u>Research Assignment for Chapters 7, 8, 10:</u> Students will be required to research a social dance from the US and a folk or world dance that is significant to the culture of a country other than the US. Details for each assignment will be given on eLearning.

(Research Assignments for Chapters 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 will total 10% of the Assignment grade.) <u>Presentation Social/World Dance Assignment</u>: 6 groups will collaborate to post research targeted on social and world dance. Details for the assignment will be posted on elearning. This assignment will be 10% of the assignment grade.

<u>Final Presentation -</u> The Final Presentation will be a group presentation on a Prominent Figure in Dance. This project will be given in class. Details for the assignment will be posted on eLearning.

Dance Performance Attendance and Written Analysis: Students will be required to attend 2 dance performances and write an analysis for each (for **one** during **summer** session). A program of the performance must accompany each paper or be turned in alone for attendance only requirement. The UTDallas Dance Ensemble performance is a required concert (for fall and spring semesters only). It may be used as one of the required performances or be a third concert for extra credit. Required concert attendance will be a concert of student's choice from **the instructor's approved performance list.** A separate hand out will be posted with analysis requirements. Analysis and program will be turned in through eLearning. Scan and submit on eLearning the cover of the program and the page or pages giving information of dances performed, choreographer, composer or musical artist, any program notes about the dance, and dancers. Write your name on the page or pages listing the information of dances performed, composer or musical artist, any program notes about the dance. When submitting a program only make sure to submit in the "text submission box" on the elearning assignment link the concert attended, company or title of performance, venue, and date of attendance along with the required program.

<u>Exams</u>: Comprehensive exams on chapters from the text, eLearning notes, assignments, class activities, and video viewing will be given during the semester. All exams will be taken on eLearning.

Make up exams will be offered only for extreme extenuating circumstances.

Written works (analysis, assignments, and required papers) must be typed, double spaced with 1 inch margins and 11-12 inch font size. Any research must use MLA format citing each reference. They will be graded on form (correct spelling, punctuation, grammar, and organization) as well as content, creativity, and research analysis. All assignments are to be turned in on time through elearning in order to receive full credit. Late assignments <u>may</u> be accepted, a 1 point deduction will be taken off the grade for each day it is late beginning on the due date (the only exceptions will be extenuating circumstances, which will be discussed with the facilitator ahead of time, if possible.) If you are unsure about your writing, present it to the facilitator well before the due date so the proper advice can be given with the assignment still remaining punctual. In most cases work more than two weeks late will not be accepted.

<u>Missed</u> <u>work</u>: missed work such as in class assignments and quizzes cannot be made-up unless missed due to documented approved excused absence.

<u>Extra Credit</u>: Please check with instructor for extra credit opportunities.

<u>Observation</u>: If a student is ill or injured or provides a valid reason to the instructor (prior to class) for non-participation in a movement session, student may sit out and observe. Students sitting out will hand in written class observations at the end of the session.

<u>Electronic Devises</u>: Cell phones must be silenced before start of class!! If there is an emergency that requires your cell phone be left on; instructor must be notified before the start of class. Failure to notify may result in loss of 3 points per disruption from the participation/class discussion grade.

Use of computers, tablets, or cell phones may only be used for note taking or research pertaining to topic being discussed during a particular class period. If the student chooses to use an electronic device it must be approved by the instructor prior to use. If approved, please be ready to show the instructor what is being viewed at any time requested during the class. Improper use could result in loss of participation points for that class.

Special Assignments Addítíonal Course requírements

Attire: On specified days (see course schedule for 'movement practicum'), students will be required to dress for movement class. Wear stretchy, reasonably form-fitting pants and tops, long hair must be tied back from your face, no dangling jewelry, chewing gum, or hats. Feet will be bare (unless otherwise noted). Water bottles are recommended.

Students will be required to view and write an analysis for two live dance concerts (one during summer sessions). A list of approved dance concert performances to attend will be provided. Some performances have an admission fee. Choose the dates, ticket prices and locations that are appropriate for you and attend accordingly. Students are responsible for their own transportation to these events. In addition to the required analysis a program from the concert attended must be submitted. Analysis and program must be submitted on eLearning. Scan and submit on eLearning the

cover of the program and the page or pages giving information of dances performed, choreographer, composer or musical artist, any program notes about the dance, and dancers. There is no need to include advertisements, Donor lists, or performer bios.

Field Trip Policies
