Course Description:

Approaches adopted by the social and policy sciences to increase understanding and develop actions to improve the world. Topics include: philosophy of science, logic of inquiry, role of theory in attributing cause, articulating answerable research questions, efficient exploration of the research literature, types of research design, qualitative approaches, transforming abstract concepts into measurable indicators, producing reliable data, assessing validity of conclusions, and research ethics and politics. Students completing this course will have a good understanding of systematic inquiry and its capacity to yield useful knowledge and a solid foundation for further study of research methods.

Course Objectives:

At the end of the course students should be able to:

- 1. Familiar with broad range of methods used in social sciences research.
- 2. Able to respond to challenges to validity of findings when conducting research.
- 3. Adept at recognizing strengths and weaknesses of alternative research designs.
- 4. Able to compare and contrast the research designs found in the literature.
- 5. Skilled at implementing research design.

<u>Top Hat</u>

We will be using the Top Hat (www.tophat.com) classroom response system in class. You will be able to submit answers to in-class questions using Apple or Android smartphones and tablets, laptops, or through text message.

Reading Assignments & Participation:

Students are responsible for reading the assigned materials from the text *before* each class session. You will be expected to discuss the readings and participate in all class activities. The lecture notes **will not** be available online, so it is in your best interest to attend every class.

Exams:

There will be 2 exams (150 points each). All exams will be posted in eLearning and are open book/notes. Exams will be available from 00:01 - 23:59 the day listed in the syllabus, but you only have 1 hour and 15 minutes to complete the exam once started. While the exams are open book/notes, the expectation is that you treat them as an in-class exam. Students will not have enough time to lookup every answer.

It is the student's responsibility to ensure they have a reliable Internet connection. It is highly recommended students take the exam on campus (in the library or in a computer lab). You are only allowed one exam reset during the entire semester due to Internet connectivity issues.

Make-up exams will not be given without documentation for a serious illness, death in the family, or required university-sponsored event.

Comparative Research Design Paper:

Students will write a 3 page paper (not including title page and reference pages) comparing the research design of *three peer-reviewed articles* on a topic of their choice (the DV must be in the same). Papers must 12pt font, Times New Roman, double-spaced, 1 inch margins. APA citations. The assignment is worth 100 points. *Papers are due by Monday, November 28th by 08:30. Students must print off a copy to hand in.*

Annotated Bibliography:

During class you will be taught how to construct an annotated bibliography. After which instructions will be handed out on the assignment. Students will have to create an annotated bibliography that has at least 3 peer-reviewed articles in APA format due by *Monday, October 31st by 23:59 via eLearning uploaded in PDF. No late submissions.*

It is the student's responsibility to ensure they have a reliable Internet connection and proper upload of submission. If I cannot open your submission it is a zero.

NO EMAIL SUBMISSIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED.

Attendance and Participation:

Attendance will be mandatory. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of every class, via TOPHAT. Students who miss a class must obtain the notes from another student. Excused absences will only be given in the event of a serious illness, an emergency, or a mandatory school function. Documentation is required. Documentation will only be accepted prior to or 1 day after the missed class. Documentation can be turned in-person or via email. Four or more unexcused absences will result in serious grade reduction. Please see grading for more information.
