DESCRIPTION OF COURSE

This course is designed to help students prepare for advanced readings and translations in the Spanish Language. Students must have completed four semesters of undergraduate courses in order to attain the intermediate competency, necessary to function in this course. Completing this workshop successfully will provide the student with the equivalent of a passing grade on the Proficiency Test required of students in the Masters and Doctorate Degrees programs in the School of Arts and Humanities. Knowledge gained in this course will enable the student to continue with courses at the University of Texas at Dallas and in any other endeavor with the Spanish language. Course work will include intensive grammar review, basic practice of translation, readings and discussions of complex texts of Literature from Spain and Latin America as well as selections from the arts and history of ideas. **OBJECTIVES:** Students will:

- a. Build on their current Spanish language skills.
- b. Focus on the finer details of the language.
- c. Expand their cultural knowledge of the Spanish-speaking world.
- d. Relate to and discuss topics relating to their Graduate majors in an interdisciplinary approach in keeping with the focus of the Graduate Program in the School of Arts and Humanities.
- e. Be prepared to continue to further Spanish language proficiency through translations, workshops, and research projects in the Graduate Degree programs.
- f. Enrich and reinforce the cultural and literary awareness of the students about the contributions of Spanish speaking people have made to the history, arts, visual arts and literature of the world and, in particular to North America.
- g. Prepare the students for the success in passing the Language Proficiency Exam.
