#### **General Core Area 050 Creative Arts**

Courses in this category focus on the appreciation and analysis of creative artifacts and works of the human imagination. Courses involve the synthesis and interpretation of artistic expression and enable critical, creative, and innovative communication about works of art.

# **Core Objectives**

- Critical Thinking (CT)-to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation, and synthesis of information
- **Communication (COM)-**to include effective development, interpretation, and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication
- **Teamwork (TW)**-to include the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal
- Social Responsibility (SR)-to include intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities

#### **Course Description**

This course provides students with the information and activities needed for a comprehensive understanding of the way theatre creates and reflects meaning in society. Students will explore theatre through the lenses of culture, performance, the voice of the theatre artist, and creative participation, including reading and analyzing plays, attending and responding to performances, group discussions of lecture topics, and a group performance project.

#### **DRAM 1310.001 Course Objectives**

The student will learn:

- **Critical thinking skills**; to analyze the significance of theater, to explore why it has survived, and to examine its influence on society (assessed via the Why Is Theater Important? paper, the live performance Play Response paper, and class discussions)
- Communication skills; to describe and interpret artistic events, and to participate in meaningful discussions about theatre and its societal impact (assessed via the live performance Response Paper and class discussions)
- **Teamwork;** to perform in a collaborative group project that takes the components of theater and puts them into practice (assessed via the final collaborative project)
- **Social responsibility;** to demonstrate knowledge of significant actors and playwrights and how culture influenced/influences their artistic expression; and knowledge of theatre's past and potential future impact on social change (assessed via the 4 periodic quizzes, the midterm exam, and the final exam)

# **Grading Criteria**

All assignments will be graded on a 100 point scale, and will be weighted according to the following percentages:

**Active Participation: (10%)** Each student is expected to attend classes, participate in discussions, and participate in creative projects required in the class.

**Reading Assignment Quizzes: (5% Each)** BRING YOUR LAPTOP TO CLASS! Quizzes will be administered via eLearning.\* Four quizzes will be administered throughout the semester based on the concepts, vocabulary, and techniques **found in the reading assignments**. Each of the quizzes will cover one or more reading assignments, and will be administered at the instructor's discretion. \*If you do not have a laptop please let me know and a paper copy will be provided.

Why is Theatre Important?: (5%) Students will write a 1 page paper on the significance of theatre in the student's life, and should reflect his/her own opinion and current knowledge of live theatre. While writing in 1<sup>st</sup> person is acceptable *for this paper*, all other academic writing guidelines must be followed.

**Play Attendance: (5% Each)** Each student will attend two live theatrical productions: one *must be* the UTD production of *Avenue Q*; one *must be* a professional production at a local Dallas area theater. Ticket stubs and/or playbills must be submitted.

**Midterm Exam: (15%)** BRING YOUR LAPTOP TO CLASS! The midterm will be administered via eLearning.\* The midterm will cover all material studied in class to date, and will include multiple choice, true/false, and fill-in-the-blank questions. DO NOT MISS THIS EXAM, no makeup will be allowed (extraordinary circumstances notwithstanding). \*If you do not have a laptop please let me know and a paper copy will be provided.

**Play Response: (10%)** Each student must write a 2-3 page response to ONE of the productions attended, following guidelines provided in class.

**Final Project Character Analysis: (5%)** Each team member will submit a 1 page character analysis for their final performance project.

**Final Performance Project: (10%)** A final 2-person scene will take the components of theatre and put them into practice. Each team member must participate in the performance. Each team will choose a scene from one of the plays read in class *or* from an approved play/film/TV show and perform it. The final presentation must be 3-5 minutes long. If each member of the team does not fully participate, the final grade will be affected. Be prepared to meet with your team outside of class for rehearsals, and be warned: if you miss the final, you may not make it up.

**Final Exam: (15%)** The Final exam will be administered via E-Learning. The exam will be available Friday Dec 9 – Tuesday Dec 13, and the student may take the exam any time during that period. Once the student begins the exam, he/she will have 3 hours to complete it.
