Course Description: CRIM 6300 Proseminar in Criminology (3 semester hours):

Introduction to graduate study in criminology through exposure to issues surrounding concepts of crime, criminals and societal response. Students learn to examine critically the theoretical, methodological and policy issues in criminology and criminal justice.

Student Learning Objectives/Outcomes:

- Present linkages between criminological and policy implications in the practice of criminal justice.
- Examine the history and evolution of crime and societal response.
- Students will analyze the various theoretical concepts within the discipline of Criminology.
- Students will acquire knowledge of criminological theory, research methods, statistics, and policy to contribute to our understanding of crime and criminality.

Grading Policy

Grades will be posted based on the following scale: Graduate: A=94-100, A-=90-93, B+= 87-89, B=84-86, B-=80-83, C+=77-79, C=70-76, F=0-69. Grades are based on the following events. **Please note that there is absolutely no extra credit work available in this class** and each student should strive to do his or her best work on each and every grading event as the course progresses. **The mathematical rule of rounding will apply to the computation of the final grade** in the course based on the grades received in the following events.

- 1. Examination I (100 points) 3 hours, online, open-book; questions from textbooks and internet sites
- 2. Forum 1 grade (100 points) Answers to five of the issues must be posted on the discussion board in essay format of 350 words or more per answer. Three bibliographic citations and the word count must be posted with each of the issue postings along with internal cites one source can be your textbook.
- 3. Forum 2 grade (100 points) Same as Forum 1 except guestions are form Forum 2.
- 4. Responses (100 points) to five of your classmates' postings either agreeing or disagreeing and stating why.
- 5. Library Research Paper 1 (100 points) on a **criminology** theory chosen by you. Theory must be approved via message by the professor prior to commencing work on the paper. Only one or two students will be allowed to write on each topic it is up to the student to get permission early if you have individual interest in a particular issue (details below). Paper must include how the theory has been researched in the literature.
- 6. Library Research Paper 2 (100 points) on an **criminal justice** topic chosen by you from your Crime and Punishment textbook. Topic must be approved via message by the professor prior to commencing work on the paper. Only one or two students will be allowed to write on each topic it is up to the student to get permission early if you have individual interest in a particular issue (details below). Paper must include discussion of the research and statistics used in prior research on your topic.
- 7. Final Examination (100 points) Essay questions testing depth of knowledge obtained during the entire course. Each student must answer five of the seven questions posed and submit them through the course assignment folder no later than the due date specified in the course calendar.
- 8. Syllabus Quiz (no credit points) This quiz is required by the due date in the course calendar before any student takes any of the exams or posts any discussion questions. Please message your professor via the course message link if you have any questions whatsoever after taking the quiz. Quiz should be repeated until you obtain a score of 100. (0 points)
- 9. Introductions (0 points) Each student should log onto the discussion board the first week of class and provide a brief introduction to the rest of the class. Please give us your class standing (where you are in the program) and why you are in the graduate program plus any other information you would like to share. Please do not provide personal phone numbers or addresses on the discussion board.

Incomplete Grade Policy: As per university policy, incomplete grades will be granted only for work unavoidably missed at the semester's end and only if 70% of the course work has been completed. An incomplete grade must be resolved within eight (8) weeks from the first day of the subsequent long semester. If the required work to complete the course and

to remove the incomplete grade is not submitted by the specified deadline, the incomplete grade is changed automatically to a grade of F.

University Drop Policy: It is the responsibility of the student to process the official drop and add forms. Faculty/staff cannot drop students from class. Please be aware the professor cannot drop a student for never attending or missing too many classes and can only assign grades based on the work submitted. Syllabus Quiz: All students are required to complete the syllabus quiz by the due date specified in the Course Calendar and Assignment section of this syllabus.

Examinations: The mid-term exam is open-book and will consist of 100 objective items each with a maximum cumulative score of 100 points on the exam. You will access the mid-term exam in the Syl Quiz, Exams, & Assignments folder assessments tool on the course homepage. Questions are taken from your textbooks and the internet sites identified in the Course Calendar & Assignment Schedule section of this syllabus. Your score will be posted in percentage scores in your gradebook with a maximum score of 100% on each. You will be given a maximum of three hours to complete the exam. Please read and study the texts and required internet sites in detail before beginning the exams. The professor will manually curve the class scores depending upon the highest grade made on each exam. The manual adjustments, if any, will be entered into your gradebook within one week of the due date for each exam. Each exam will be available to you seven days before the due date. Failure to take the exams during the time window available results in a grade of 0.

The final examination will consist of five essay questions which must be submitted via the course assignments tool to your professor no later than the date provided in the Course Calendar and Assignment Schedule later in this syllabus. Answers may be sent as a file attachment by clicking on the Final Exam link in the Syl Quiz, Exams, & Assignments folder on the course homepage and following the on screen instructions to upload and submit your exam. The examination will be posted to the course homepage one week prior to the due date. The questions must be completed in Word compatible format and must consist of one to two pages per answer with appropriate citing throughout. Further instructions will accompany the Examination when it is posted.

Discussion Board Questions: Ten of the issues in your text (T2) must be answered with each item worth 20 points for a cumulative score of 100 on each forum. Five of the discussion questions must be posted from Forum 1 and five more must be posted from Forum 2 by the due dates in the course calendar & assignment section of this syllabus. Discussion Board items may be posted early and this is highly encouraged to avoid last minute problems. Questions not posted by the due dates will be reduced in grade 10 percent per calendar day. Any questions not received by the last day of regular class will receive a score of zero. Do not post your answers as an attached file because attached files will not receive a grade ultimately resulting in a zero. Discussion question answers must be the student's own original work and must be 350 words or longer. Post the question number and repeat the question you are answering before writing your answer. Each answer must be followed by the bibliographic information on three sources of information including your textbook and the posting must be followed by a word count. The word count does not include the bibliographic information nor the question. Be sure to indicate through internal citations where you use each source in your posting. The bibliographic information and word count must be repeated for each and every answer and you should strive to use as many different sources as possible other than your textbook. In other words, please treat each discussion question as a mini-paper with three references including your textbook and two additional sources. Answers that are simply blocked and moved from any other site that are not the original work of the student posting the answer will receive a grade of zero unless properly cited and the student will be referred for disciplinary action by the university.

Responses: Students are required to briefly and respectfully comment in five responses to other students' discussion questions. There is no length requirement for the responses to other student answers. Your responses should be based on the substantive content of their posting and must address the content of their answer. DO NOT criticize the other student or make negative references about the student. **Be sure you are responding to another student's posting rather than to my posting of the question.**

Attention to proper writing and correct spelling when posting the discussion questions and responses is expected and is a part of the grade received for the assignment. Use proper grammar and spelling and do not use any type of abbreviations

not found in a commonly accepted, standardized English dictionary. All comments posted by students must be in formal language with no intolerant, rude, abusive, or obscene language. Violations of this policy will be referred for disciplinary action with the recommendation that the student be expelled from the class!

Library Research Paper 1: Pick a criminology theory of your choice. Get permission to proceed with that topic from the professor via course messages. You may request such permission any time after 8 am on the first day of class and only one or two students (depending on the size of the class) will be permitted to write on any one individual topic. Topics will be assigned in the order in which the request is received by the professor. Proceed to write an 8 to 10 page paper on your topic in APA format, double spaced, in font 11 or 12, with one inch margins. Must have eight or more references with a minimum of three scholarly articles. Submit paper on the course assignment link in the Syl Quiz, Exams, & Assignments folder on the course homepage by clicking on the folder and then on Paper 1 and following the on screen instructions to upload and submit your paper.

Library Research Paper 2: Pick a criminal justice topic of your choice. Get permission to proceed with that topic from the professor via course messages. You may request such permission any time after 8 am on the first day of class and only one or two students (depending on the size of the class) will be permitted to write on any one topic. Topics will be assigned in the order in which the request is received by the professor. Proceed to write an 8 to 10 page paper on your topic in APA format, double spaced, in font 11 or 12, with one inch margins. Must have eight or more references with a minimum of three scholarly articles. Submit paper on the course assignment link in the Syl Quiz, Exams, & Assignments folder on the course homepage by clicking on the folder and then on Paper 2 and following the on screen instructions to upload and submit your paper. Be sure to include a discussion of prior research methods and statistics used to research your topic.

Introductions: Students should go to the discussion board and post a brief introduction about themselves during the **first week of class.** Please do not post addresses or other personal contact information on the discussion board. Give a brief summary about yourself including what year you are in, your major, and any future career goals if you have formulated them.
