Course Description: BIS 1100-Freshman Seminar (1 Semester hour of credit)

This course is a graduation requirement for the University and the School of Interdisciplinary Studies (IS). Incoming freshmen will learn about the intellectual and cultural environment of the University and the School of Interdisciplinary Studies. Students will learn about IS majors, careers, internships and clubs and organizations. This course consists of class and field activities. This course is also open to non-IS majors. Graded. Co-requisite UNIV 1010, where you register and take the CLA test by September x7. (College Learning Assessment)

NOTE: BIS 1100 is a requirement for graduation from UT Dallas. If you drop the course or do not receive credit at the end of the semester, you must take a makeup course in a subsequent semester. You must take the CLA to pass the class.

Course Objectives and Outcomes:

- To introduce you to the School of Interdisciplinary Studies, including majors, research and career opportunities.
- To connect you with the UT Dallas campus community through presentations, campus involvement, and interactions with faculty, staff and peers.
- Integrate academically and socially into the Interdisciplinary Studies community.
- Maintain mutually supportive relationships with freshman classmates, academic advisors, and instructors; learn to work as a team.
- Understand the importance of critical thinking and writing skills for academic success.
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Administrative outcomes from Core Curriculum Committee:

1. Freshmen will be able to relate the core curriculum learning outcomes and degree program outcomes to the goal of being an educated individual in a democratic society after completion of their degree.
2. Freshmen will examine their own skills as an incoming university student through self-assessment: then compare their assessment to the skills necessary for success as university students including critical thinking skills, communication skills, teamwork skills, empirical and quantitative skills, and social and personal responsibility.

3. Freshmen will use new skills presented in the course as a roadmap to academic success.
4. Freshmen will be integrated into the university community.

Comet Pledge: As a Comet, I pledge honesty, integrity, and service in all I do.

Required Materials:

Class format and Instructor's Expectations:

This course will consist of lectures, guest speakers, discussions, student presentations, and a variety of assignments to be completed inside and outside of class. You will be introduced to the Interdisciplinary Studies undergraduate degree programs and its faculty. Class attendance is mandatory and will be documented. Cell phones need to be turned off or on silent as a courtesy to the instructor and fellow students. If your cell phone rings, it's mine for the day. Unless otherwise noted, laptops are NOT necessary for taking notes in class and should not be opened unless we are doing an online activity. Bring a pen and notebook if you wish to take notes.

Portfolio requirement: you will post on elearning a portfolio of your own design in Power-Point detailing your self-assessments, career ideas, and field activities. A rubric will be used to assess it and compare it to you again at some future time. It will be reviewed at some later date by a panel of unknown people to generate assessment numbers and possibly review what skills, issues and ideas are prevalent with today's UTD students. Do not include any personal material that you do not want to share with random strangers or see on the web in 10 years' time. An assessment rubric will possibly be uploaded to a cloud website, UTD box .

Video presentation: Students will join into groups of five and make a five minute video presentation about their majors or life at UTD. You will present them in class for your grade. A teamwork rubric will be on elearning for you to complete about your team. You must use only the allowed video formats or it will not be viewable and you will not get credit for it.

It will also be posted in UTD box to be reviewed at some later date by a panel of unknown people to generate assessment statistics, and possibly review what skills, issues and ideas are prevalent with today's UTD students. Do not include any material that you do not want to share with random strangers. Since all students may not have Smartphones, I-pads or video skills, we will ask for those with more skills and equipment to be team leaders and recorders.

Field Activities

During the semester you will go off on your own or in groups to pursue field activities which will become part of your portfolio. Examples of some field activities include:

Required: (4 points apiece)

- Required. Review what community service activities are available to you through organizations. Attend a meeting of the organization and decide if it's something you want to join. Pre-professional organizations exist in most fields, as well as recreational clubs. Part of your social responsibility goal. React, Assess, Write up: RAW

*Financial planning activity: required. Estimate the cost of your degree plan over 4 years. Estimate how you will pay for it. If you are planning on grad school, include that as well. Speak to financial aid office if necessary to find out resources available such as loans and scholarships. Estimate potential earnings from your chosen career. Part of your personal responsibility goal. - RAW

*Adviser visit: Visit with your adviser to devise and review your 4 year degree plan. Part of personal responsibility goal. React, assess and write up. RAW

Other possible activities – choose at least 2, or more for extra credit:

Visit with someone doing what you think you want to do for your career, reactions, assess, and write up. RAW

Library Tour: this may be included in your library day session or on your own. Go on a 30 minute scheduled library tour to see the physical layout of the library and resources available. You can sign up for a tour on this website: RAW

There will be one offered at a time your section is not meeting.

Career Center: go to Career Center, look over their resources, take self-assessments, speak to counselor, set up an account. Pay particular attention to resources for internships. Part of personal responsibility. RAW

Study Abroad Office: go to office, look over resources, speak to counselor about process for this and what they offer. RAW

Faculty visit: go to office hours of a faculty member, ask questions related to courses you are in, find out how they got here and about their career and research. RAW

Student athletic event visit: go to an athletic event and cheer our team. RAW

Arts performance or lecture event: go to a campus event and partake in enjoyment or new knowledge. RAW

HPAC office or Teacher Education office: go to their office and find out about resources they offer. Meet with counselor. RAW (We will have classroom speakers about these as well)

Counseling center: go to counseling center or medical center on campus, see what resources they offer. Understand how to make an appointment, see counselor or nurse/doctor if advisable. RAW

Attendance:

Attendance is required for BIS 1100 . Please notify instructor via email of any circumstance preventing you from attending class. Documentation will be required for excused absences such as athletic participation. If it's a religious holiday, let me know in advance. I personally don't want you spreading germs in class to infect others, so don't come to class sick. Your fellow students will appreciate it as well. Email me to let me know.

Group Presentation:

Students will work with a group of their classmates to explore a topic related to their university experience, major or area of interest within the Interdisciplinary Studies Department. Students will collaborate with other group members to share their findings with the class using a multimedia format that may include photos, video, and/or music. It will be presented in class at the end of the semester and it will be submitted as a 5 minute video to a university website as well, or turned in on a flashdrive. Each person should speak for about a minute. Make this fun! Group presentations will take place on the weeks of November 16 and 30 and if needed December 7. Should be about 5 minutes per group of 5. I would rather you sing and dance rather than read PowerPoint's.

Career paper and resume: You will write a resume and also a short paper (2 or more pages) on a career you think you want. What are the pros and cons of this career? What preparation does it take? Explore what others in this career have said. Submit to me and also to turnitin on elearning.

Grading:

20% Group Presentation - video
20% career statement and resume
20% required and optional field activity submissions – 4 points apiece (3 required and 2 optional)
Extra credit points possible for participation in class or extra field activities as laid out in the assignment handout.
