Course Description

State government and politics. The course covers topics that relate to the state government and policy process. The course begins with a discussion of Texas political culture, federalism, and the Texas Constitution. Then, the course proceeds to a discussion of Texas institutions. The final part of the class discusses Texas political behavior. Despite the large class size, there will be class discussion along with lecture. It is crucial that students have the material before class and are prepared to discuss.

- -Evaluate the role of interest groups, political parties, and public opinion in Texas politics.
- -Analyze and think critically about issues and policies in Texas politics.
- -Identify, describe, and analyze the electoral and institutional processes.

-Analyze and appreciate historical trends in the development of state institutions, constitutional foundations, and the development of the Texas constitution.

-Describe how course topics affect being personally and socially responsible.
