Course Description

Introduction to Crime and Criminology (CRIM 1307) examines the nature, location, and impact of crime in the United States by exploring a broad range of issues related to criminology. Topics focused on within the course include the historical foundations of crime, the theoretical underpinnings of criminality, how we measure criminal acts, development of criminal careers, the various typologies of offenders and victims, and a critical analysis of public policies concerning crime control in society.

Student Learning Objectives/Outcomes (in no particular order)

There are several objectives of this course. The most important are as follows:

1. To learn the foundations of criminological thought and trace the development of criminological thought throughout history;
 2. To identify what makes a good theory;
 3. To recognize the differing criminological perspectives and be able to compare and contrast them;
 4. To critically evaluate criminological theories based on established criteria within the field;
 5. To apply the tenets of criminological theory to the application of criminological problems within the broader social justice systems, including the criminal justice system, the political system, the educational system, and the social welfare system;
 6. To assess the efficacy of the social justice systems in implementing meaningful policies and programs based on criminological theories.

Exams will consist of any of the following: multiple-choice questions, true/false questions, fill-in word questions, short answers, and essay questions. More information about each exam will be given during the course of the semester.

Quizzes: 200 points

There will be five (5) in-class quizzes throughout the course of the semester. Each quiz is worth 50 points, for a total of 200 points. Please note that the lowest quiz grade will be dropped. Quizzes will be unannounced. Quizzes may cover class material covered on the day of the quiz and material covered in the lecture prior. This will include lectures, movies, and guest speakers.

Quizzes can only be made up for three (3) reasons:

1. You are participating in an official activity of a UTD organization.
2. Military service requirements.
3. Observation of a religious holiday.

*Please remember that it is the student's responsibility to notify the professor IN ADVANCE if they are going to miss class for any of these reasons. It is expected that the student will provide notification to the professor in the beginning of the semester.
