General Course Information

Description: This course will provide students with an introduction to Texas's state government and politics in the context of other US states and the federal government. Students will learn general information about state governments in general and the public policy process at the state level. The course begins with a discussion of state political cultures and economies and then exploring Texas's political culture and economy. The course will cover the concepts of federalism and state constitutions with a specific emphasis on the Texas state constitution. The course will be conducted primarily through lecture with limited class discussions.

Objectives: By the end of the semester student will:

- Learn about the interaction of state governments and the federal government/ learn about the interaction of citizens and their state
- Understand how Texas state government operates
- Apply political science theories to analyze to past and current political events
- Learn about the scientific process that political science use to better understand politics
- Think critically about past and current political events and articulate analyses in writing
- Gain a knowledge of civic responsibility and the ability to engage effectively in state and local government
