Course Objectives – Students will learn:

- About skills and knowledge related to core student learning outcomes; specifically, personal reflection, critical thinking skills, communication skills, teamwork, social responsibility, and personal responsibility
- Skills to help achieve academic, personal, and social success
- About the value of the liberal arts and the marketable skills associated with the arts and humanities
- About the School of Arts & Humanities and UT Dallas
- Ways to engage with the campus community and the community at large

Course Description:

<u>ARHM 1100</u> - Freshman Seminar (1 semester hour) This course is a graduation requirement for all freshmen in the School of Arts and Humanities (A&H). Incoming freshmen will learn about the intellectual and cultural environment in the School of Arts and Humanities through lectures, activities, guest panels, and attendance at artistic and cultural events. Students will also learn about A&H majors (Art and Performance, Historical Studies, and Literary Studies), research opportunities, careers, and internships. This course is open to all non-A&H majors. Credit/No Credit. Corequisite: UNIV 1010. (1-1) Y

- UT Dallas is a selective admissions institution with one of the highest average Freshman class SAT scores in the state; therefore, performance and participation in ARHM 1100 is expected to reflect the caliber of students and academic standards of the university as a whole.
- The course objectives for ARHM 1100 represent goals which are fundamental to student success both inside and outside of the college classroom.

Attendance Policy:

Attendance will be taken promptly at the start of class. You are only allowed to sign-in for yourself. Signing in for another person is considered academic misconduct (i.e. cheating) and is subject to sanctions enforced by the Dean of Students.

Second Absence	10 points off attendance grade
Third Absence	10 points off attendance grade
Fourth Absence	Automatic failure of the course

Students may have an excused absence which will not count against their attendance grade. Excused absences must concern an unforeseeable event that could not be prevented. In order for a student's absence to be considered excused, the student must provide official documentation (e.g. a doctor's note or police report of accident) during the next class meeting. It is up to the discretion of the instructors to deem an absence as excused. Events that can be scheduled at a different time (e.g. a follow-up doctor's appointment or regular car maintenance) or situations that are preventable (e.g. sleeping through an alarm clock's "wake up" call or not having a ride) do not constitute an excused absence.

Arriving late and leaving early are disruptive to lecture and class activities and will affect your attendance/participation grade. If late, it is your responsibility to inform the instructors *immediately after class* that you actually attended class. Students will lose 2 points from their score for every tardy they receive after the first one (in other words, students have one "free" tardy). Students will lose points for leaving class early at the instructors' discretion.

Course & Instructor Policies:

- Cell phones must be turned off or to vibrate and are not to be answered or used for text messaging during class time. Instructors will deduct 5 points per infraction from the attendance/participation score if we see students using their phone during class.

A Note about UNIV 1010/2020:

Although students must register for UNIV 1010/2020, these are not actual classes. In essence, UNIV 1010/2020 is an assessment about critical thinking which must be completed in the Testing Center. Students take the CLA+ assessment test upon entering UT Dallas and receive credit for UNIV 1010. Students will also take the CLA+ assessment when they finish their core courses and will receive credit for UNIV 2020. Students won't receive a grade for the CLA+ will receive either "credit" or "no credit" on their transcript for UNIV 1010 and UNIV 2020. UNIV 1010 and UNIV 2020 are graduation requirements; this means they **must** be completed in order to graduate.

The Office of Undergraduate Education developed UNIV 1010/2020 to assess the breadth of skills and knowledge acquired by students who complete the general education core. There are several reasons why this assessment is necessary. The core is specifically assessed because core courses provide the skills/knowledge that all students need to succeed in their post-baccalaureate endeavors. Additionally, assessment results enable the university to provide evidence that are students are meeting the core academic student learning outcomes and are seeking ways to improve instruction. Essentially this process shows that the degrees offered by UTD are valuable as the results are considered in the calculation of national university rankings.
