COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to introduce incoming freshmen to the intellectual and cultural environment of the School of Economic, Political and Policy Sciences (EPPS). Students will develop academic skills and integrate into the EPPS community through an exploration of topics related to the social sciences. They also will explore majors and how they relate to career outcomes. In keeping with the learning outcome of social responsibility, this course will take a service-learning approach. As students participate in a variety of service activities, they will learn how social scientists apply their analytical tools to real-world problems and policies.

NOTE: EPPS 1110 is a requirement for graduation from UT Dallas. If you drop the course or do not receive credit at the end of the semester, you must take the course again in a subsequent fall semester.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Freshmen will be able to relate the core curriculum learning outcomes and degree program outcomes to the goal of being an educated individual in a democratic society after completion of their degree.
- Freshmen will examine their own skills as an incoming university student through self-assessment, then compare their assessment to the skills necessary for success as university students including critical thinking skills, communication skills, teamwork skills, empirical and quantitative skills, and social and personal responsibility.
- Freshmen will use new skills presented in the course as a roadmap to academic success.
- Freshmen will be integrated into the university community.

CLASS FORMAT AND INSTRUCTOR'S EXPECTATIONS:

Welcome to EPPS 1110! Our theme this semester is **CONNECT AND EXPLORE**. You will be connecting with the School of Economic, Political and Policy Sciences and its faculty, students, organizations and clubs. You also will be connecting with the university and the community at large. During the course of the semester, you will be exploring your major and other social science disciplines within the school, as well as careers that you can pursue after graduation. The portfolio requirement outlined later in this syllabus will enable you to develop a game plan to help you achieve your goals. You also will be required to participate in one service project, either on or off campus. Service topics will be designed to stir your intellectual curiosity and inspire you to question and understand the workings of society. Class attendance is mandatory and will be documented.

ASSIGNMENTS

CONNECT - EPPS EVENT/WIKI

You will be required to attend one EPPS event during the month of September and post photographic evidence (a selfie) on the class wiki in eLearning. To fulfill this requirement, you may attend an academic lecture, EPPS club or organization meeting or social function. Please your photo by creating your own page on the class wiki by following the instructions in eLearning.

CONNECT - SERVICE-LEARNING/REFLECTION

EPPS 1110 students will be required to complete one service activity by the end of October. Service opportunities will be related to specific areas of study within the social sciences: immigration, homelessness, food insecurity, access to health care, voter participation, educational inequality, criminal justice, and sustainability. We will be working with the UT Dallas Office of Volunteerism to ensure you can choose a service project that fits your interests, passions, skills and schedule. The goal is to encourage you to learn about issues related to the social sciences while engaging in a meaningful service activity that helps develop your sense of social responsibility.

Service learning is based in pedagogy, and therefore differs from volunteering. As a volunteer, you might work at a homeless shelter. As a service learner, you must also examine why homeless shelters are necessary, what type of people they serve, as well as circumstances that lead to homelessness. You also might research whether homeless shelters should be reformed in some way or even exist. To facilitate this connection between theory and practice and foster critical thinking, you will be required to research your selected topic before participating in a service activity. You will then combine theory and practice in a reflection posted on the class wiki in eLearning that will be used to document your service activity.

EXPLORE - PORTFOLIO REQUIREMENT

Even though you are a first-semester freshman, this course is designed to encourage you to look ahead to your post-graduation goals and develop a plan for achieving them. During the course of the semester, you will be completing two interim assignments that facilitate completion of your end-of-semester capstone project: The Portfolio. Your portfolio is unique to you and will reflect your interests, abilities, and passions. Four years from now, you will be able to reflect back on where you started and see how far you have come during your college journey. More details on the portfolio requirement will be presented in class and on eLearning.

CLASS ATTENDANCE/PARTICIPATION

We will only meet for two hours per week, therefore it is essential that you are in class and participate in activities and discussion. **You are allowed 2 unexcused absences. If you miss more than two classes, you will not receive credit for the class.** For an excused absence, you must adhere to the following:

- All students participating on UT Dallas competitive teams (athletic and academic) must bring an official Intercollegiate Competition Memo **2 weeks prior** to any sanctioned absences.
- Students observing a holy day must inform the instructor **before** the class day to be missed.
- In the event you are ill and unable to attend class, email your instructor right away and obtain a doctor's note; if you do not have a doctor's note, the absence will be considered unexcused.

CLA+ Assessment - Appointment Scheduling Instructions

TESTING DATES: AUGUST 27 TO SEPTEMBER 3

As an incoming freshman, please be aware that you are required to take the CLA+ assessment to satisfy UNIV 1010 requirements. You can take the assessment at the UT Dallas Student Success Center - **Testing Center only** from **Saturday, August 27, 2016 through Saturday, September 3, 2016.**

CLA+ Assessment - Appointment Scheduling Instructions

1. Log on to Testing Center website utdallas.edu/studentsuccess/testingcenter
2. Click on "RESERVE-A-SEAT" located at the right corner at top of page
3. Once prompted, **select the school** you are enrolled in (JSOM, ECS, NSM, etc.)
4. Click on the test **"CLA+ Assessment – UNIV 1010, Fall 2016"**
5. All available test dates will be either be displayed in a green-shaded date box with its time slot, **or** in a drop-down box.
6. **Click** on the green-shaded square to select your desired time slot, **or** select the desired time slot from the list of time slots available in the drop-down box
7. The **Exam Summary** page appears. Complete the required fields.
8. Read the **Student Acknowledgement** in the scroll box. Acknowledge the information **by clicking the check box underneath the scroll box.**
9. An **email confirmation** will be sent to your UTD email address you used to register for your test. You may print the receipt for your records.
10. If you wish to reschedule or cancel your appointment, please log back on to the Testing Center website and click on "How To Reschedule" tab.

Again, testing dates are Saturday, August 27, 2016 through Saturday, September 3, 2016.
