HIST 3324: Women in Modern European Society

This course will examine the varied historical experiences of women in European societies between approximately 1750 and 1985. Beginning with the transition to modernity, we will attempt to construct an understanding of the lives of women of different eras, different nations, and different social classes.

We will consider the multiple relations of women to the family, work, and politics. Our aim will be to identify both how modern European societies have defined the "proper" role of women and how women have collectively and individually adapted, challenged, and transformed such definitions.
