Connect Quizzes

Students will be required to log on to the McGraw-Hill Connect website and take a quiz prior to the material on which we will be lecturing that day. The purpose of this quiz is to ensure that students are reading the course material, so that the class can move at a quicker pace and spend more time discussing those elements of the course we find more interesting. The quizzes will serve as a study aid for students.

Exams

There will be two exams in this course on the dates listed on the syllabus. Because the Professor fundamentally disagrees with making students purchase testing forms and to accommodate those students with test-anxiety, all exams are given online. Students will have 75-minutes maximum to complete the exam. Exams will open at class time (i.e., 1 PM) on the day listed and all exams must be submitted by the end of class time (i.e., 2:15 PM). Please note that late exams will not be graded. If students start the exam at 1 PM they will have a full 75 minutes to complete the exam, but students starting the exam at 130 PM will only have 45 minutes to complete and submit the exam.

Experience dictates that students feel that they will be able to use outside resources during the exam; however, this strategy is inadvisable. Those students who perform best are as prepared for the exam taken online as if it were administered in class. Lastly, all available countermeasures are employed to prevent and detect academic integrity violations. All students who violate academic integrity standards will be punished to the fullest extent available.

Class Activities

Students will complete various types of class activities in class to enhance learning. All class activities will be collected at the end of class and it is student's responsibility to ensure the activity is turned in, their name is on the activity, and the answer is legibly written. The Professor will assume illegibly written answers are incorrect and will not pursue students who have not turned in assignments or whose name is not on the assignment.
