Dr. Sabiha Al Khemir, Senior Advisor for Islamic Art at the DMA and Distinguished Scholar of Islamic Art in Residence at the O'Donnell Institute Spring 2017

This seminar program offers an introduction to the arts of the Islamic world. Using material that covers a wide time and geographical span (from the 7th century onwards and from the Western Mediterranean to South Asia), the seminar explores the main characteristics of the visual language of the Islamic world in its color and exuberance, its form and spirit. The seminar focuses on topics related to narrative and representation, cross cultural exchange, and innovative approaches, highlighting what distinguishes the identity of "Islamic art". It looks in depth at the role of calligraphy, geometry, so-called 'arabesque', the question of figural representation. The course also looks closely at some of the Islamic world, such as luster-painted pottery. The seminar will engage students in close study of the art of the object and the cultural dimension objects carry, focussing on the intimate link between aesthetics and culture. The course aims to build an understanding of Islamic art and culture, in its diversity and unity. It uses the Keir Collection at the DMA as a major resource to illustrate the topics taught, as well as examples from world collections of Islamic art.
