COURSE DESCRIPTION

RHET 1302 will prepare you for college-level writing while helping you develop your critical thinking skills. Rhetoric is the study and practice of how people communicate with audiences, not only in writing and speech, but also through visual and digital media. In this class, you will develop skills to analyze the way rhetoric, in its various forms, addresses audiences. By paying attention to the strategies that good writers use to address their readers, you will learn to reason better and to persuade others in your own writing, both through rhetorical appeals and through analysis of audience and purpose that is at the heart of the study of rhetoric. Practically speaking, you will also learn skills that you can use in your future coursework regardless of your major.

ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS:

In-Class Writing Assignments: will typically take about 20-30 minutes and will be related to material discussed in class. These assignments will have prompts given in class, which directly relate to the upcoming essay assignment in methodology, approach, and subject matter. These will be hand-written exercises.

Peer-Reviews: All of your essays will go through the peer review process. By analyzing the work of your peers, you will hone your own writing skills. You job is to offer constructive criticism. On the day a draft of your essay is due, come to class with a hard-copy of your draft. ** If you come to class on the day of a Peer Review without a draft of your essay, you will not be able to participate in the Peer Review process. This will significantly affect the quality of your Conference time, because you will have no Peer Review document to discuss.

Essays: Specific information will be distributed and discussed in class for each essay.

Extra-Credit: You will have the opportunity to complete one extra credit assignment during the semester worth a total of 20 points. More information will be given in class. No extra-credit assignments will be accepted after the last day of class.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

You are permitted to miss <u>THREE</u> classes, no questions asked. After that, your attendance/ participation grade will be reduced by ten points for each additional absence. Please arrive to class on time. Three late arrivals will result in one absence. Late arrival is arriving ten minutes or more after class has started.

You are expected to actively participate in class discussions in a thoughtful and professional manner on a regular basis.
