Instructional Mode	We will use Microsoft Teams to conduct our live remote classes. Microsoft Teams is a web conferencing tool the university is recommending for use when conducting and recording our class lectures this Fall. Microsoft Stream is the video-storage website where your meeting recordings and any videos you upload are stored. The main advantage to using Teams and Stream is the ability of these two tools to automatically generate captions, allowing us to comply with accessibility requirements.

Asynchronous Learning Guidelines

In order to promote and maximize student learning, I will upload lecture recordings before our class, such that you will have extensive flexibilities to watch the recording, think about the case and consider your questions. Each lecture covers the full contents of each chapter, so there is a large volume of information and knowledge for you to study. Thus, each lecture will be conducted in two consecutive classes each week (Tue. & Thu. each week). Yet, I will upload the full content of lecture recording before Tue. (during the weekend). In this regard, you can choose a time which is convenient for you to study. Furthermore, in order to maximize your flexibilities, I will divide the lecture into a few small sections based on the learning objectives of each chapter. You can choose how many sections you want to learn each time.

Each lecture is supposed to be conducted on both Tue. and Thu. However, I will upload the full content during the weekend before each Tue., please try your best to finish watching the video by each Thursday. We will meet up each Thursday via Microsoft Teams to discuss your questions and have an in-depth discussion of the case if you are interested in. You can always drop me an email to make an appointment to talk via Microsoft Teams at your convenience. Remote access mode will be explained in the next section.

Course Description

Globalization is the worldwide trend of business expanding beyond their domestic borders. To compete in today's global economy, managers need to be able to apply management principles across countries and cultures with suitable adaptation in the process. Adopting a truly global perspective of management, this course presents current thinking in international business theory and practice. The course will cover topics such as international trade theories, culture, internationalization of the entrepreneurial firms, international strategy, and global human resource management. Among others, the course has two main objectives: (1) developing a regard for human values and the ability to make judgments based on ethical and environmental considerations, and (2) understanding the multicultural aspects and international dimensions of the world in which we live and be familiar with knowledge and methods necessary to deal with related problems.

Course Policies

Make-up exams

The open-book three tests consists of multiple choice questions and is of one hour duration. Students can access the exams on eLearning **anytime on the exam day**, so *No make-up tests will be given!* Requests for rescheduling the test will be considered only with timely notification and appropriate documentation, such as a written excuse from a medical doctor or the academic dean. The format of a rescheduled test will be up to the instructor's discretion.

Extra Credit

Following the university's guideline for grade distribution, the final grade of a student will be based on the relative standing of his or her total credit points accumulated from all the requirements as compared with the rest of the class. In compliance with the university's policy of confidentiality, no grade information will be transmitted via phone or e-mail.

Late Work

This course adopts a policy of punishing freeloading. After the presentation is over, a student may report in writing to the instructor the name of one freeloader (i.e., who has not contributed adequately to the group effort) in his or her group. If a student is reported to be a freeloader by all the other group members, he or she will be penalized by a reduction of 10 points (out of 100) from the score of the country profile presentation. However, if the alleged freeloader has virtually contributed nothing toward the presentation, the penalty will be much more severe he or she will get zero points.
